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



Church Windows

The stained glass windows in St Michael & All Angels came from two manufacturers. The windows in the Nave/South Aisle were made by Mayer & Co of Munich. The East Window, behind the Altar, was made by Powell Brothers of Leeds.

The East Window was installed in 1891, an event that warranted a write-up in the Northampton Mercury:

The Northampton Mercury, Friday May 15th 1891 The Church - stained glass of a very rich and effective character has just been inserted into the east window of the ancient church of Creaton. The subject, which is carried throughout the three openings, is the Ascension. The Saviour, clothed in a white robe and surrounded by a radiating golden glory, is seen rising from the midst of His disciples, who are no merely dignified figures calmly watching their vanishing Lord, but men struck with sudden consternation, thrown on their knees, with outstretched [arms] and open mouths, their empty centre showing how suddenly He had been taken from them. On each side of the ascending Saviour is an angel as though directing the attention of the Apostles below, and bearing a riband with the legend "This same Jesus which is taken from you into Heaven, shall so come in like manner." The colouring of the window throughout is bright yet subdued, a large amount of beautiful silvery white glass being used, and positive colours, where introduced, being small in quantity and choice of tone, the whole producing an effect somewhat similar to the old glass painting and consequently being well in keeping with the late 14th century architectural surroundings. This window has been designed and executed by Messrs Powell Brothers, of 30, Park-square,

The top tracery light (see right) contains the letters IHS, initials for the Latin lesus Hominum Salvato - Jesus Saviour of Mankind. Below this are the Archangels Michael (on the left) and Gabriel. Michael is carrying a flaming sword and Gabriel a stem of lilies. Because these are quite high up, Gabriel is sometimes taken to be Archangel Raphael. Whilst Gabriel carries lilies, Raphael is often seen with a fish. I suggest binoculars to have a good look. The East Window was part of a number of changes to the church, particularly the Chancel, towards the end of the 19th century. The organ chamber was added in 1888 and a makeover took place in 1898 when the altar, triptych, wall paintings and oak fittings were put in. It is thought that the ceiling was painted blue with gold stars and indeed one or two can remember that still being the case in the 1950's. That all went when the roof to the chancel was replaced.

The Creaton Heritage Project is researching the history of St Michael's and the community, as part of the 800th anniversary of the church which will take place in 2026. If you have any memories or information, please contact Bob Tomalin at:






survived by his wife, Judithe, children Emma and Julian, and grandchildren Thomas, Oscar and Evie.

HOLLOWELL BIRDING NOTES - THE MARSH HARRIER

Marsh Harriers breed almost exclusively in large reedbeds, but they can be seen in very varied habitats and widespread locations. In Northamptonshire, Marsh Harriers are scarce or uncommon visitors in most years, but records are increasing in frequency and becoming more widespread, with birds now often seen regularly away from more typical large wetland sites. In recent weeks I have seen them on several occasions at Hollowell Reservoir. At Borough Hill near Daventry a couple of weeks ago, I watched one drift high over the hill heading south and I recently saw a male bird from my back garden as it flew over Hollowell village towards Creaton.



Across Europe there is a migratory population of Marsh Harriers which breed in late spring across the continent and into Russia, moving south to spend the winter in Africa. There is also a resident

population in western Europe and the British Isles. Immature and non-breeding birds from this population can be nomadic in their movements and therefore appear away from typical wetland reedbed habitats. They will often feed in cultivated areas and in open, dry country; I have seen them in recent years in late summer on recently mowed meadows, often associating with commoner raptors such as Buzzards and Kestrels.

Marsh Harriers have two main distinct plumage types. Adult males usually appear multi-coloured and contrasting, with separate areas of brown, silver-grey and black feathers. Female and juvenile birds are chocolate brown overall, with cream on the crown, chin and upper forewings. Juvenile birds may appear very dark brown overall: good views will also reveal pale feather fringes. There can be some variation within these types, as there are pale and dark morphs or forms. Birds moulting between juvenile and adult plumage can show characteristics of both main types. An extreme example of this plumage variation has been evident locally this year, with two young leucistic birds being seen in many locations across our region after fledging at the Otmoor RSPB reserve in Oxfordshire. These birds exhibit a remarkable combination of black and white plumage. One of these striking individuals was seen recently in Northamptonshire at the Wildlife Trust reserve at Lilbourne Meadows.

Marsh Harriers can be mistaken for other medium to large raptors, but with experience of the combination of plumage types and structural differences they are usually distinctive. Often as large as a Buzzard, but with relatively longer and slimmer wings and tail; and a different flight action, often quartering low over their hunting grounds with sudden changes of direction and height, or gliding or soaring with their wings held in a shallow 'V'.

Marsh Harriers are not known to have recently bred in Northamptonshire, but with plenty of suitable habitat along the Nene Valley, it seems likely that they will do before long. Meanwhile, it's worth keeping an eye out, these impressive birds can turn up across the year almost anywhere in our region.

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MESSAGE FROM REVEREND CAROLINE BURNETT THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

CHURCH NEWS



I don't know how old one has to be to remember the character from a 1913 children's story book, Pollyanna, the little girl who went through life playing what she called 'The Glad Game', always finding something to be grateful for in every situation. She came in for a bit of stick in latter years; over-analysed

perhaps, and accused of being in denial. But really, her philosophy of gratitude is pretty trendy these days, with wellbeing coaches and therapists urging us to be grateful. There are any number of gratitude quotes on the internet, all helping us to see ways to be thankful for what we have in our lives. Travelling through life with an attitude of gratitude (or gladness!) really does seem to make a positive difference to our mental health in the face of all that disturbs us about the world.

This feels to me like the secular world taking a healthy dip into the Christian world, where we've always been encouraged to be thankful in our prayers and praise, before we begin to hold up to God those things that we trust will change for the better somehow, through God's power and grace.

The season of Harvest Festivals, or Harvest Thanksgivings, is upon us. Although the grain harvest was brought in back in August and September there are still fruits and vegetables to be gathered and stored for the winter. In our churches we sing songs and use words that express our thankfulness to God for the abundant gifts that creation gives us, as well as our gratitude to those who work the land and seas and bring food to our tables in so many ways.

The joy of the harvest season is summed up in one of my

favourite harvest hymns is one that's rarely sung these days. It's to the wonderfully named tune 'Golden Sheaves' and its first verse has the words:

Bright robes of gold the fields adorn, the hills with joy are ringing, the valleys stand so thick with corn that even they are singing.

Driving around the Northamptonshire countryside back in August these words often came to my mind.

As we move towards the end of October and early November we go from the season of harvest to a season of remembering. We have our service of Remembrance and Hope at 5pm on Sunday 27th October at Ravensthorpe Church where we to come and remember loved ones departed; this service is open to all. And we have All Saints and All Souls days and we have Remembrance Sunday, all at the beginning of November.

Can we bring our approach of gratitude to this season as well?

The American playwright and writer Thornton Wilder said, 'The highest tribute to the dead is not grief but gratitude'. In the throes of grief this might be a difficult thought, but perhaps it is something to work towards as we make the journey through loss. To be grateful for and to those from whom we're parted by death might make a lot of sense and help us to take some tentative steps forward on that journey.

Pollyanna knew a thing or two about life: gratitude is good for us and it strengthens our relationship with God if we remind ourselves always of the blessings that God pours out for us.



- 90g light brown sugar (packed)
- 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 2 large eggs
- 100g granulated sugar
- 120g butter, melted
- 125mL milk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 120g plain flour
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- 2 medium cooking apples peeled, cored, and finely diced tart baking apples

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180 C and set an oven rack in the middle position. Spray an 8.5 x 4.5-inch loaf pan lightly with nonstick cooking spray. Line the long side of the pan with a parchment paper "sling" and spray lightly with nonstick cooking spray again.
- 2. In a small bowl, mix the brown sugar and cinnamon until evenly combined. Set aside
- In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment beat the eggs and granulated sugar on medium speed until pale and creamy, about 2 minute
- 4. With the mixer on low, gradually add the melted butter followed by the milk and vanilla, and mix just until
- 5. Add the flour, salt, and baking powder to the batter and mix on low speed until evenly combine
- Add the apples to the batter and fold with a rubber spatula until evenly incorporated.
- Spoon about 3/2 of the batter into the prepared pan Sprinkle about 3/3 of the brown sugar-cinnamon mixture on top of the batter. Spoon the remaining batter over top, followed by the remaining brown sugar-cinnamon
- 8. Bake for about 50 minutes, until the bread is golden brown and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Let the bread cool on a rack for about 30 minutes, then use the parchment sling to lift the bread out of the pan and onto the rack. Let cool completely before slicing, a few hours or overnight. Store loosely covered with aluminum foil on the countertop for up to
