SAXON SPIRES WITH DR SUSIE NORTHOVER ARE RAISING VITAL FUNDS FOR CANCER RESEARCH

On Saturday 22nd March Saxon Spires and Dr Susie Northover encouraged people in our communities to take part a special Brixworth Park Walk, Run and Roll to raise funds for Cancer Research. The event took place after this issue had gone to print, but they are still fundraising and here's why.

"Those that know me will know that I am passionate about walking. Walking for health. Walking for wellbeing. Walking for mindfulness. Walking for transport (!) I am determined to get more people out there seeing the benefits! In June 2024, I was forced to retire due to ill health when I was diagnosed with a rare and incurable brain tumour known as glioblastoma. There are very limited treatment options for this type of cancer and treatment has not changed in decades. In recent years however, Cancer Research UK have been funding some trials in to the use of immunotherapy drugs for glioblastoma, and the genetics involved in these types of tumour. For me personally, this research is critical, as I have one of the specific gene mutations being studied, as well as two other mutations potentially passed on within my family which may well also prove to be relevant as the research continues. The ongoing research could make a direct difference for my family as well as myself." Susie

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Special Sawbill at Ravensthorpe Reservoir

The morning of Wednesday January 29th began with clear skies and early sunshine: both very welcome after what had felt like a largely grey and dismal winter. I'd almost completed a clockwise lap of Ravensthorpe Reservoir and was




walking across the causeway towards Coton when I spotted two dazzlingly white shapes through the low hedge to my left. Scanning through a gap with binoculars I was greeted with the unmistakeable sight of two drake Smew.

The Smew is a member of the sawbill family of diving ducks, named for the serrated teeth with which they grip their fish and aquatic-insect prey. As is often the case with wildfowl, adult male and female plumages are very different. Females are largely grey overall, with a white chin and cheek and a dark red/brown crown, nape and forehead. Juvenile males are very similar to adult females: both are informally referred to as 'redheads'. Adult males on the other hand are strikingly white overall, sharply marked with neat black lines and black panels on the wings, with grey vermiculated flanks and a black eyemask, all topped off with a white crest with black sides at the rear which meet in a 'V' at the back of the head. At distance, drakes can be mistaken for gulls; they are also rather small and can be surprisingly hard to spot against the water in certain light conditions.

In the British Isles Smew are annual winter visitors, usually in small numbers, prone to seasonal movements as they are driven from their ice-bound breeding areas in Scandinavia and Russia. Milder winters appear to be reducing this tendency, one reason perhaps that Smew are increasingly scarce visitors to our county. At their breeding grounds, Smew frequent tree-lined lakes and slow-flowing rivers, nesting in holes in trees. Wintering birds often also favour tree-lined bodies of water: Ravensthorpe has over the years been a reliable site, along with the northern arms of Pitsford Reservoir.

While wintering Smew may linger for several weeks at favoured sites, recent local records have often involved short-staying birds. That proved to be the case with these two: they stuck around long enough to delight local birders throughout the day, giving close views in continued bright sunshine, but by the afternoon they had split up and - apart from a brief view of a single bird two days later - they were not seen again.

One of the local-patch highlights of this winter: any sighting of a drake Smew is always welcome; and to see these two at close proximity in fine weather was something really special.

Cottesbrooke Village Kitchen

Ingredients

- >200g Arborio rice (risotto rice) 1 tbs olive oil 1 small onion, finely chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 150g asparagus, chopped into bite size pieces 150g peas, fresh or frozen 1 medium courgette, diced
- 125ml dry white wine (optional) 1 ltr vegetable or chicken stock (kept warm) 50g grated parmesan cheese 30g butter Fresh herbs (such as basil, parsley or mint) for garnish Salt and pepper to taste

Prepare the Vegetables:

Heat the olive oil in a large pan or skillet over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and garlic, cooking until softened (about 2-3 minutes). Add the asparagus, peas, and courgette to the pan and sauté for another 4-5 minutes until the vegetables are tender but still bright and vibrant.

Cook the Rissotto:

Stir the Arborio rice into the pan with the vegetables and cook for 12 minutes until the rice is lightly toasted and coated in the olive oil. Add the Wine: If using, pour in the white wine and cook, stirring constantly until the wine is almost completely absorbed by the rice. Add Stock Gradually: Begin adding the warm stock, one ladleful at a time, stirring frequently. Wait until the liquid is mostly absorbed before adding the next ladleful of stock, Continue this process for 18-20 minutes, until the rice is creamy and cooked to your liking (it should be tender with a slight bite).

Finish the Risotto:

Once the rice is cooked, remove the pan fro the heat and stir in the butter and Parmesan cheese until creamy. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Serve:

Spoon the risotto into bowls and garnish with fresh herbs. For an extra pop of colour, you can sprinkle some additional grated Parmesan or lemon zest on top.

St Michael and All Angels

You may have noticed the huge pile of timber in the church yard! The builders working in the tower discovered that the floorboards and joists in the tower floor were in a very poor state and so have removed them. A new floor will be built with oak floor boards, and this should last for many decades.

The pine panels on the walls of the tower have also been removed because they were badly damaged by damp. The architect has advised us leave exposed the lower part of the tower walls to allow the stone to breathe. The stonework will be cleaned and re -pointed with lime mortar. Once this work is complete new oak cupboards will be installed and the oak and glass tower screen erected.



The restoration work needed in the tower is much more extensive than we had anticipated, and the PCC is extremely grateful to the Garfield Weston Foundation and the Bernard Sunley Foundation for their grants towards this work; and to the late Simon Bown for his generous bequest to help us complete this project. The PCC apologises that we have to keep the church locked whilst the builders are working in the tower.

The pipe organ has been dismantled and removed to the workshop of Cousans Organs Ltd for restoration. We are really looking forward to hearing our restored organ played for our Easter services.



- It's used by over 2,000 juniors and adults to play football and cricket.
- Villagers walk their dogs, knock a football around, use the nets and the exercise equipment and just enjoy the fresh air.
- The Association is a charity and under its charter any radical change means we have the duty to consult the whole village, so we are inviting you to get involved and find out more.

Over the last few years, it has proved harder and harder to raise the essential $\pounds 12,000$ needed (maintenance, insurance etc.) so we are looking to the Guilsborough community to help, or help us explore what this land should be used for.

£14,000 Uplift for the Guilsborough Village Hall Stage

The Guilsborough Village Hall stage lighting rigging and other structures had not been updated for at least 50 years, were 'past their sell-by date', and didn't meet modern safety standards. In stepped Tom Harper, a Guilsborough resident who happens to run a local company 'Unusual Rigging' and has been involved in the local drama group 'GMADS' in the past. Tom arranged for his expert team to install new rigging structures above the stage and in the main hall, worth £8,000, for free! Unusual Rigging, based at Bugbrooke, are the UK's most experienced provider of rigging and stage engineering solutions, for example serving most of the London Theatres, and several Olympic Games.

Unusual's generous donation allowed the Village Hall/GMADS to secure a further £4,200 grant for a new sound system, wiring and curtains; so another big "thank you" goes to the Northamptonshire Community Foundation's Compton Fund. GMADS, Guilsborough Parish Council and Village Hall together put in another £1,000 cash.

There is now a fantastic theatre stage with a superb PA and sound system, perhaps the best in the Uplands Area, all ready for the next 50 years. The award-winning drama group GMADS performed three nights of the comedy "Vice Versa" in the hall to about 200 theatre-goers at the end of this March. The stage and Bluetooth speakers are now available to anyone who wishes to book the hall – providing a much better experience

Days gone by, a snippet of Guilsborough's history

In the distant past we had various plagues, smallpox and other killer diseases. These included a cholera outbreak caused by contaminated water



in Northampton in 1638, where 665 people died. Recently I was researching Medical Officer Annual Reports for the Brixworth Area (including our local villages), going back over 100 years and some surprising revelations resulted. In 1898, in the days before antibiotics, there was a major outbreak of scarlet fever in Guilsborough and surrounding villages. This disease can be fatal.

Also in 1898, there was an epidemic of diphtheria in Guilsborough spreading to Coton, Creaton and Holdenby. It was fatal 5% to 10% of the time. Other scarlet fever epidemics hit again in 1904 and 1926. In 1904 there were 1,127 cases in the County, and 7 in Guilsborough where the then Grammar School was closed for weeks.

In 1933 there was a drought leading to a severe water shortage in Guilsborough, which had no piped water for the then 127 houses. There was only one public well with a hand pump down Nortoft, and 50 private wells (where are they all now? – I know of about 10). By 1954 only 144 houses of the then 169 houses had piped water. In 1948 Guilsborough Grammar School's well was contaminated with faeces, and needed chlorination.

In 1938, nine cottages in Neaton Lane, Nortoft were demolished as unfit to live in, as they had just two shared outside wells, no electricity, and only outside toilets. In 1946, just after the war, 43 houses in Guilsborough had minor defects, 15 needed structural repair, and nine houses were unfit for human habitation and had to pulled down. Also in 1938 Hollowell reservoir was opened, providing clean water and allowed piped water to start to be put into homes. In recent years water companies have failed to stop sewage going into streams, however in 2023 Anglian Water finished a new £4m storm water storage system and nutrient removal

facility at its water recycling centre at Creaton Road in Hollowell.

We still have some issues, but health is certainly better now than it was in the past! David O'Neil is the Chair of Guilsborough History Society, which can be found on Facebook.

The Jane Letts Trust - the tale of a Victorian Laundress and her Joiner Brother

You may have seen the annual advert in this magazine, for the Miss Jane Letts Charity; a small trust fund set up in 1941 and overseen by three Hollowell Parish Councillors. Jan, Emily and Viv from Hollowell have done some research. The Charity's original objective was to purchase coal or blankets for distribution amongst 'poor widows and other deserving poor' of the parish.

In the 1990s, the terms were amended to enable the Trust to contribute to electricity bills. But who was Jane Letts and who set up the Trust?

A search of the census records established Mary Ann Jane Letts, known as Jane, was born in Guilsborough in 1856. Her parents were James William Letts, a carpenter from Guilsborough, and Elizabeth from Wellingborough. She had a brother James and a sister Sarah.

Jane and her sister lived together in Guilsborough. Jane was a laundress but also an employer. Then, some point during the 1890s, Jane moved to Rickmansworth to work as a laundrymaid at The Lodge, Loudwater. We have not been able to discover why she left Guilsborough, but it seems a step down from being an employer to being a laundrymaid. Her death certificate shows she died in 1899 in Guys Hospital, London, of Pernicious Anaemia, aged 43. Of James William Boothe Letts' life we have been able to establish the following. He was a lodger, living first in Northampton and then in Kingsthorpe and worked as a joiner. He became known as' Boothe Letts'.

In 1915, aged about 57, he retired to Abthorpe. He lived in a cottage at the end of the village variously called Letts Cottage, Heggs Cottage, Brackley Road Cottage, Sheppard House and now Grafton View.

He did carpentry jobs around the village and was known to be a spiritualist. He ate and drank well but always pleaded poverty and when he grew ill, tried to get public assistance with his care and was eventually taken in by a local nurse in the village, who cared for him during his last 10 days. An elderly resident of Abthorpe recalled that 'Old Mr Letts' kept the house in good order, doing all the repairs himself. The orchard was spectacular, and he had a huge pear tree near the road and encouraged the children of the village to help themselves to the fallen pears.



He would take the bus into Northampton on Saturdays to carry out business deals, have lunch/dinner in town and catch the late bus back. The local postmaster was also sending off telegrams for him ordering the sale and purchase of stocks and



shares. She said that it was not a secret in the village that he was wealthy, but he dressed more like a tramp. She could also recall his sister Sarah. She was a Medium and a number of people visited her when their family members 'passed over'. Old Mr Letts was devastated when his sister Sarah died and wore her cape forever afterwards.

James William Boothe Letts died on 16 December 1940, aged 82, and his death was recorded at nearby Towcester.

To everyone's astonishment, his probate record showed he had left \pounds 13,948.

He left all his tools to the Dr Barnardos Homes, £500 was to be used to set upt the Jane Letts Charity and £3000 was to endow a trust for three beds at Northampton General Hospital, the beds to be placed on the middle floor of Grafton Ward with brass plates to say "This bed is endowed by James William Boothe Letts in memory of his mother Elizabeth Sykes Letts" - but these were lost

until they turned up in a cupboard amongst a collection of 73 more plaques.

The rest of the estate was to be divided between Guy's Hospital and the Salvation Army. So, we learnt a lot about the Letts family but are left still with big questions. None of the three siblings ever lived in Hollowell, but all three are buried and commemorated in Hollowell Churchyard.

Why, having lived in Guilsborough all their lives and appearing to be doing well, did both girls move away in the 1890s?

Why, in 1933, did James Letts make a will in aid of the poor of Hollowell?



What caused him to specify in his will, that no one from the church could be a Trustee? Was there a serious disagreement with the Guilsborough Vicar? Was it because of his interest in spiritualism? We remain intrigued by this interesting character.

CHURCH NEWS



As I write this, my thoughts turn to preparations for Lent and Easter. Lent, a significant season in the Church's calendar, mirrors the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness, as described in the Bible. It is a time of reflection and preparation—an opportunity to pause, look inward, and engage in a kind

of spiritual and mental spring cleaning. Symbolically, the Church embraces simplicity and solemnity during this time, removing flowers and decorations and streamlining parts of the liturgy to help us focus on Jesus' ministry and suffering. For me, Lent always deepens my appreciation of the joy of Easter when it arrives.

Many of you will know that in the early Church, Lent began after Shrove Tuesday—better known today as Pancake Day. This was traditionally a time to clear the larder of fats and sugars, marked by a feast before entering the simplicity of Lent. Over time, this practice evolved into the custom of giving up indulgences like chocolate, biscuits, or alcohol. A few years ago, I reconsidered my own Lenten practice. I realised that giving something up—didn't necessarily bring me closer to God. Instead, I decided to take something on: reading a book, joining a Lent study group, or engaging in a spiritual discipline that would enrich my faith.

This year, during Lent we will be studying together, learning through The Prayer Course. All are welcome to join in with this – please email revallisontwigg@gmail.com for more information.

Lent also carries with it the quiet promise of spring. As the season unfolds, snowdrops, crocuses, and daffodils begin to break through the soil, adding splashes of colour to our winter-weary gardens. Their emergence is a reminder that new life is on the way.

As Lent begins, I pray that we all find moments to pause, reflect, and perhaps do a little spring-cleaning in our own lives preparing our hearts for the glory of Easter.
