PAST & PRESENT ON PARADE

The 80th Anniversary of VE Day, organised by the local branch of the RBL was held in Guilsborough Village Hall on 8th May and was supported by over 100 people. Entertainment was provided by GMADS which included several Churchillian moments. Live 1940's music was provided by Jim Carroll and included a singalong of popular wartime songs. Memories of VE day were shared by three locals, Ann Moss, Pauline Boyes and Pam Cook. A 13-page booklet covering Guilsborough during the war years is available from David O'Neil. 


Creaton WI

HISTORY NOTES

Friends of St Michael History Group

The final talk of the 24/25 season was given by John Perkins. Called 'What have the Puritans ever done for us?', it was an interesting look through the many, many things that have influenced our language, our poetry, and our literature, that arose out of the Puritan period. It was clear at the end of the evening that the Puritan period had left its mark in all areas of life, and not just in whitewashed church walls.

The season started with a new Committee. Over the period there were two successful Cake & Coffee mornings that will help fund the next season's speakers and allow FOSM to make a donation to the work to be carried out on the War Memorial. The Cake & Coffee morning in March included a display about land ownership in Creaton. One aspect was who owned what at the time of Enclosure in 1782. The largest landowner then was Robert Andrew. His family lived in Harlestone but they had owned land in Creaton for many years. His is but one of many examples where Creaton land was owned by many who did not live here. Creaton seems not to have been a place with its own 'Lord of the Manor'.

The 25/26 season starts in September.





A Brighter Future - Briefing on Upgrade to LED of Street Lamps in Hollowell & Teeton Parish

The Parish Council has responsibility for 32 street lamps: There are 13 Bracket Lamps fitted to wooden poles and one Bracket Lamp fitted to a wall (No's 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 13, 14,

20, 24, 30 & 31) all at 36 watts. 18 Steel Poles (No's I, 2, 9, 10, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 29 & 32 – at 36 Watt except Lamp No 10 + Highfield Park 25, 26, 27, 28 all at 42 watt).

Lamp No. 10 has been upgraded to LED (18 watt) but not fitted with Part Night Cell whereas Lamp No. 22 remains at 36 watts but has been fitted with a Part Night Cell.

In 2023 the Council was required to undertake an inspection of all 32 Street Lamps within the parish to comply with BS 7671. This was completed by the Street Lamp Maintenance Contractor Eon, and the subsequent report identified Street Lamp No. 10, fitted on a bracket, to be '*in a very poor condition*' and failed the inspection which is why it has been replaced with a steel pole and upgraded to LED 18 watt. Eon has since advised that when they surveyed the lights, they found that some of the brackets were still in good condition and did not need to be replaced, but as part of a quotation to upgrade to LED Eon identified eight brackets requiring replacement. Upgrade to LED:

The Council has been in receipt of funding from West Northamptonshire Council as a share of monies collected through the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), At the Parish Council meeting on the 19th March 2025 the Council approved the expenditure from the CIL funds towards the upgrading of some of the street lamps. The change from 36 watt to 18 watt LED will offer potential savings on electricity charges which continue to be one of the larger costs for the Parish. **Eight Lamps fitted to brackets that require**

replacement:

PLS 6, 20 & 30 CHURCHILL, PLS 11,12,13 & 14 GUILSBOROUGH HILL, PL 24 CREATON LANE TEETON. Eon proposed - Remove existing lantern & bracket to tip, supply & install new galvanised steel bracket fitted with 18w Holophane LED lantern and dusk to dawn photocells.

The Council will continue to review options for further upgrade of remaining Street Lamps

19 Lamps installed on steel columns or brackets: PLS I to 5 CREATON RD (3 – 5 Bracket), PLS 7, 8, 9 & 29 CHURCHILL (7 & 8 Bracket), PLS I5 & 16 ORCHARD CLOSE, PLS 17, 18 & 19 SPRING CLOSE, PL 21 RAVENSTHORPE RD TEETON, PL 22 HOLDENBY RD TEETON, PL 23 CREATON LANE TEETON, PL 31 GUILSBOROUGH RD (31 Bracket), PL 32 RAVENSTHORPE RD TEETON.



MESSAGE FROM REVEREND CAROLINE BURNETT, THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

CHURCH NEWS



On the Sunday of the London Marathon in April I was straight home from taking church services to watch the television coverage. My friend's daughter, Laura, was running in it. For her it was the twelfth of twelve marathons that she'd run in the year following the death of her husband from Leukaemia. He'd only been in his mid-thirties and he left behind a

very young child as well as his wife and family. Laura was raising money for the Anthony Nolan Trust. The 27th April, the day of the marathon, was her sixth wedding anniversary so she ran the last leg of it wearing her wedding dress.

I've often heard people say that they find watching this event emotional and uplifting and for me, this year, that was absolutely true. I was so moved by Laura's story, but also by the love and support that surrounded her. Her friends had her wedding dress ready, hanging on a road sign for her to put on when she got near the finish line and their pleasure at being able to support her like that was obvious, as was their love and care for her. What's so powerful is that her story was repeated more than 56,000 times, with each person who ran raising money for a charitable cause close to their heart, usually with a moving tale attached – a lost loved one perhaps, or people who need extra help at home or abroad. And each runner was surrounded by a loving community of family and friends supporting them. That's a lot of people all together.

At the moment we might feel that we could do with our faith in humanity restored and there it was – 56,640 people and their little communities, showing people's very best qualities and what can be achieved when love and care are motivators.
