



Throwing Gold at 80

For many of us a simple walk along a country footpath every now and then is enough to keep us thinking we are fit but for Creton resident John Love, physical exercise is something that he has been doing for most of his long life.

At the age of 80, John recently competed in the Midland Masters Track & Field Championships, gaining medals for the British Standard for 80 year-olds in the Hammer Throw, the Discus Throw and the Shot Put.

John's athletic ambitions started at the age of 15 when he joined Northampton and County AC in 1954. For the next 40 years he competed in track, cross-country and road races with some local success. His running also took him to Israel to take part in the World Masters Cross Country Championships.

At 60 he changed from Track racing to Field events and for the past 20 years has been throwing things for fun and for competition.

Often seen of a morning practicing on the Playing Fields in Creton, John is undergoing chemotherapy for cancer having already had his kidney removed, and yet his illness does not stand in the way of keeping fit. In the recent Midland Masters John won first places in the Shot Put and the Hammer Throw and a second place in the Javelin. All three were Personal Bests.

During his working life, John was the Estate Plumber at Althorp, but he still found time to not only take in part in sport but also train the next generations of athletes. For many years he was

a coach with the Northampton Phoenix AC, which sometimes had as many as 40 in the squad. He was also their President for 20 years.

John is now an honorary member of Rugby & Northampton AC that superseded Phoenix. He is also qualified Track & Field official and spends many of his weekends around the Midlands officiating and helping at Special Needs Track & Field events.





What next? Well I don't know. Perhaps locally produced boot polish (though I am sure someone will tell me it already exists). If it does, I might just try it.

FIELD NOTES



The Small Tortoiseshell butterfly is a bright creature you will see fluttering along the hedgerows. It can be seen at almost any time of year if the weather is good and are often found over-wintering in sheds.

It is one of the most widespread of butterflies in the UK, possibly helped by the abundance of nettles on which it lays its eggs. When they have hatched out, the caterpillars chomp their way through their favourite food plant.

According to the Butterfly Conservation Trust the population density of Small Tortoiseshell butterflies has gone down by 3% since the 1970s, and this of low concern. Keep an eye out for them particularly from Spring right through to Autumn.

The amusing and topical scene from A Midsummer's Night's Dream played by the drama group was the highlight of the evening as the audience moved around the garden with the players to great effect.



MESSAGE FROM REVEREND ALLISON TWIGG ASSOCIATE PRIEST, THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

CHURCH

As I drive around the villages that make up The Uplands Group of Churches, from the beauty of our villages and the hills, valleys and reservoirs that surround us constantly amazes me. As I travel from community to community for meetings and services and visits and events I often give thanks for the beautiful Northamptonshire countryside and for the green, rolling lushness of the landscape.

At this time of year, particularly with the 'generous' amount of rain we have had so far this summer, the countryside is full to overflowing with the bounty of nature; leaves, grasses, wildflowers, seed heads, moving with the breath of the wind, being beaten down by the heavy rain, drinking it up when it is light, lifting up towards the warmth of the sun (when it appears). And of course our farming community find all of this helpful and not so helpful at times in the course of producing food for our shops and tables.

As I look at the beauty that surrounds us, and the busy-ness of those that work the land here I am often reminded of a bible passage "I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit... Abide in me as I abide in you."

The word that struck me here was abide. Abide means to remain, to wait, to continue to be held, to be present. It's a gentle word and I felt a great deal of peace when pondering it in a beautiful garden in the sunshine.

Jesus is the vine, God is the gardener, we are the branches of the plant, our job is to 'abide' to remain in God's presence and He will transform us into something beautiful. Plants will grow in their own good time and that's that surely? Perhaps it's not that simple?

This month the Pick Your Own season is in full swing;

strawberries, raspberries and all sorts of yummy goodness but nowadays we can have the fruit we want even when it's out of season and we can even grow our own strawberries or soft fruits early by forcing. The plants will produce fruit but generally at the cost of the plant itself.

Life can be a little like that, can't it? We feel like we have to force ourselves to bear fruit, to be successful, to keep up with the expectations of others, of society and even ourselves. The problem is that can sometimes be at the cost of our wellbeing. The news is full of stories of those that are struggling with their mental health. In a recent survey more than 74% of adults confessed to being overwhelmed or unable to cope in the past year. But it's not just the adults, 1 in 8 children/young people aged between 5 and 19 has a diagnosed mental health condition.

In that kind of world this bible passage has a lot to say to us. We don't have to conform to those expectations, we don't have to continually push ourselves, it's ok just to 'be' sometimes, in fact it's more than ok, it's essential! C.S Lewis sums it up brilliantly:

"A car is made to run on gas, and it would not run properly on anything else. God designed the human machine to run on himself. He himself is the fuel our spirits were designed to burn, or the food our spirits were designed to feed on. There is no other."

We're heading in to summer; it's the ideal time to slow down a bit and 'abide', to reconnect with ourselves, those we love and with God. I pray for lots of opportunities for all of us to do just that, I am sure we will all be better for it!

ST ETHELDREDA: THE WINDOWS

We are very fortunate to have some fine windows in our village church, designed or manufactured by William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones.

It is many years since the church windows have been cleaned. Thanks to a legacy (which is restricted to the preservation and maintenance of the building and the fabric) we have now been able to undertake this task. We engaged a firm of Architectural Glass Artists who did a comprehensive survey of all windows and completed the cleaning in early June. Scaffolding was brought in to clean the upper clerestory windows, and the difference in light was immediately noticeable. Microbial growth and green algae had built up over the years, and this was problematic for the cleaning of the precious stained glass windows, as the pigment had become very fragile.

Only limited, gentle cleaning with a special techniques and solutions was advised. Our 12th century parish church has many features of note. If you are walking, driving or cycling by, the church is always open in the daytime for visiting – or simply to take a rest in beautiful, quiet surroundings.

Our visitors book records comments from far and wide. We are lucky to have the church on our doorstep.
