Guilsborough has had a fire station in the village for over 75 years. Currently


there is a crew of seven firefighters responding from the station to all manner of incidents in the local vicinity and throughout the county, including road traffic collisions, fires, animal rescue, assisting the ambulance service, flooding, and many more.

The crew train on Monday evenings 7-9pm, and then respond via mobile pagers when required to attend incidents. This year the stations crew have responded to over 90 incidents countywide.

If you feel that you would like to be a part of the fire service, the station is always looking for new recruits. If you live or work within eight minutes of the station and would like to help provide an essential service to the local community, you will be supported and guided throughout the process. Its fetching green colour will make it hard to miss. Hopefully it is never needed. However, if it is all the instructions are on the unit. Most importantly, the access Code is obtained by dialling 999 as it has been registered on their database.

The Village Hall has entered into a Contract for the upkeep of this unit to ensure it is kept fully maintained and in working order should it ever be needed. This incurs an ongoing charge but one we see as essential. To cover this ongoing cost, the Village Hall has requested donations for this potentially life saving piece of equipment. 



Sally Goldberg organised the most amazing raffle prizes, and everyone appeared to go home with a prize or two.

Doreen Kimberlin

1930 - 2023



Doreen and her 'Maserati'

Doreen was born in Houghton on the Hill, Leicestershire and lived most of her life in and around Leicester. Despite the war Doreen had a wonderful childhood full of various antics with her friends, long walks with the dogs and her Mum, and of riding her beloved Raffles, a Welsh Mountain pony. In 1955, she was introduced to Peter Kimberlin, the son of her Father's business colleague. It was love at first sight and after a whirlwind 3 weeks they were engaged. The young Mrs Kimberlin's ambition in life was to be a good mother and wife and that she certainly was! She was a fierce defender of her children and dedicated all her life to them, with summer holidays packed with days out and weekday evenings full of activities. The slightest interest in something was met with lessons and activities: swimming pools, tennis courts, squash courts, gymkhana rings, and in the 1980s pounding the streets of Chelmsford, knocking on doors to persuade people to vote for her son!

When her husband Peter became Lord Mayor in 1990, Doreen took on the role of Lady Mayoress though she much preferred helping with the washing up at functions, mayoral chain and all, rather than the limelight.

Doreen moved into her daughter Jane's home in Creaton in 2005. Embracing her new life in the village, she joined the History Group, the WI and took charge of the Creaton Walking Group supporters which meant organising the pub lunches and picking up limping and exhausted walkers! Always enjoying being active, in the last heavy snowfall in Creaton, Doreen was seen tobogganing down the field adjacent to Teeton Lane! In the last few years, when getting out and about proved a tad harder, Doreen would be seen zipping round the village and the lanes on her 'Maserati'.


Doreen passed away peacefully at home on Saturday 23rd December 2023. A Requiem Mass was held at Our Lady of Victories Roman Catholic Church, Market Harborough. Doreen is survived by her son David, daughter Jane and granddaughter Rebecca.



Ruben was educated at Great Creaton Primary School and Guilsborough Secondary School. Whilst his SATs were by all accounts reasonable, his A-Level results left much to be desired.

Now living in Manchester and backed by a supportive family, patient girlfriend, and the allimportant arrogance of youth, Ruben has at last succeeded in clawing back some dignity to his name, leaving the *Ungradeable* mark he received in English Literature to be little



more than an ironic footnote upon a soon to be flourishing career. He writes here today in third person. He is, perhaps, a little embarrassed to be sharing his good news. Nonetheless, if he were to truly commit to the meta self-indulgence of this paragraph and push himself, as an interviewee - and not an interviewer - into providing a quote, he might well say something like this:

"Please buy my book. It is genuinely quite good and I am very proud of it. Thank you".

The questionnaire gives you - resident or business owner in Creaton - the opportunity to express your thoughts so that the Plan reflects your opinions. Please respond so that the Plan represents our community, and future plans consider our wishes. The questionnaire can be completed on line (details on the form) or you can complete the paper version and either hand it in at the shop or at Lilac Cottage, High Street.

The Localism Act of 2011 has given local residents the power to shape the future of their village and neighbourhood. Under the Act we can have a say in housing design, appearance and location. But it is not just about housing. The Plan can include policies to protect green spaces, heritage assets, community facilities, parking, and transport. Perhaps more crucially for Creaton we can have a say about what facilities and opportunities we can create to attract and retain small businesses in the village.

So please get involved now and have your say. Help shape the future of Creaton.

This questionnaire is an important part of the process. It will be used to understand the Community opinion as a whole. This then provides the basis for the draft Plan to be written, as a reflection of the consensus views of all the residents of our Parish.

At our December meeting we agreed the budget for the financial year that runs from April 2024 to March 2025. We have included the same contribution towards our bus service as we made this year in the hope that we will continue to benefit from at least the same level of bus service as we currently do. However, this is far from certain as the current operator, Uno Busses, are withdrawing from all bus operations. Our services have been put out to tender and we await the outcome of this process. We have also budgeted to begin a rolling replacement of our older street lamps with new LED ones. This will be over several years and the benefits are that it will reduce our energy costs, as they use significantly less electricity, as well as reduce repair costs to the older lamps.

Having agreed our budget, we have also set our precept for the next financial year. A Parish Council's precept is it's main, if not only, source of income and is collected on our behalf by WMC as part of your Council Tax. Last year, as we were benefitting from having entered into a fixed price for our street lighting electricity, we were able to keep our precept the same as the previous year. This time, we have had to increase the precept due to our fixed price agreement coming to an end plus insurances, as for everyone, have gone up. As a council, it is considered by our National Association, if not a requirement, then prudent to keep reserves equal to half of our precept which means if we increase our precept then we are expected to increase our reserves. Accordingly, our precept has increased by just under 13% which equates to, based on the average band D property, £0.69p per Council Tax payment or just over £6.90 per year.

A WAXWING WINTER

At the end of 2022 my piece in this column was speculatively titled "Will it be a Waxwing Winter?" Alas, it proved not to be. Despite some promising early reports in the north of the British Isles, the roaming

flocks that year didn't generally venture south in any numbers and reports dwindled away as winter progressed. 2023-2024 on the other hand, has turned out to be a vintage Waxwing winter, giving most of us the best chance since 2013 to catch up with this characterful and attractive species. As I write this in the first week of January, we have had recent local reports from Higham Ferrers, Northampton, Corby, Duston and Brixworth - with hundreds more reports from across much of the UK. Waxwings are annual winter visitors to the British Isles, but generally only scarcely and in small numbers. In some years however, there will be an invasion, or irruption of these birds, with large numbers dispersing from northern mainland Europe, usually due to a shortage of suitable food sources, particularly berries. In irruption years Waxwings are often seen in residential areas or commercial or municipal spaces, where they may be attracted by plantings of berry-bearing plants such as Cotoneaster. A favoured food in their normal wintering grounds is Rowan berries, so they will also often be found in Rowans, or

other Sorbus trees, including garden varieties.

Waxwings can be very confiding and tend to be mobile and lively, so they are often easy to see; birds in a group will also frequently call - a high-pitched and far carrying "siirrrr", with a pleasing trilling, silvery quality. When seen well, Waxwings are unmistakeable, being greyish pink overall, with a black bib and eye mask, a rufous cinnamon-coloured undertail, black, white, yellow and red wing markings and a yellow end to the black tail. They also have a prominent crest, which may be flattened in flight or at rest, but often raised conspicuously when the bird is active. The name Waxwing derives from the fact that small extended red tips to some of the wing feathers can appear like blobs of sealing wax. When not feeding, flocks can rest quietly in treetops and bushes, and may be easily overlooked, so it's worth checking any group of Starling-sized birds seen in these habitats. The full name of the Waxwing most often seen in the British Isles is the Bohemian Waxwing, Bombycilla garrulus. There are two other species in the genus: the Cedar Waxwing, an extremely rare visitor from North America and the Japanese Waxwing, a species found in north-east Asia. Waxwings may be present in the UK until March, and flocks will

continue to be mobile as trees and bushes become stripped of their berries, so you may be lucky enough to catch up with these striking birds as they pass through Northamptonshire before heading off to their Scandinavian breeding grounds.

Tribute To Longstanding Hollowell Resident Ted Hunter

by his son-in-law, Tim Malynn (extract)

Ted was born on the 8th March 1930 to Harry and Alice. He and his four sisters lived at number 9 Henley Street, Far Cotton in a small terraced house. His childhood was typical of pre-war England playing in the street, in the fields, enjoying the luxury of an outside toilet and no bathroom. A tin bath in front of the fire was the norm.

Ted's father, Harry, worked on the railway so it was not surprising that Ted would follow in his footsteps when he left school aged 14.

In late 1947 Ted contracted TB which resulted in the removal of his left lung and two ribs and a 2 year stay in Creaton Hospital. Ted features in a book entitled 'A Country Cure' by Sue Longworth. His memories in there are priceless. He recalls, "After 2 years in Creaton Hospital I was discharged and told by my doctors that I would not be able to do manual work. I was offered a green card which was for a disability, but I was 20 years old and had different ideas. Two years later I was playing Town League football".

"After leaving hospital I worked at S&W Motors in Abington Street and then for a time on the buses. There was no support from the local authorities...... At the end of my working life, I was Manager of JCB Digger Yard and retired in 1995. I am enjoying

life on one lung."

Whilst working as a Bus Conductor Ted met Vera and they married in July 1954. At first they had a room in Semilong, Northampton and moved to Church Hill, Hollowell in early 1955. Ted worked shifts, swept chimneys, cleaned windows and did anything to make ends meet.

Ted was a longstanding Southampton supporter and took his neighbour's son Paul to many matches. Paul's relative was a defender at Southampton hence they were able to go into the changing rooms and onto the pitch and meet all the players. The highlight was the 1976 FA cup final when the team beat Manchester United. The programme of that match was a cherished keepsake of Ted's and is buried with him. Sadly, Vera passed away suddenly in April 2003 leaving the family in shock and Ted feeling lost. We really didn't know how he was going to cope without her.

Fate intervened when Ted and Cathy met. It was clear right from the start that Ted had found love for a second time. Cathy gave him something to live for. Ted moved from Hollowell in April, after nearly 70 years, to live with Cathy in Creaton so she could better look after him. Ted passed away in his sleep at Northampton General hospital, on 7th October.

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MESSAGE FROM REVEREND ALLISON TWIGG THE UPLANDS GROUP OF CHURCHES

CHURCH NEWS



Our villages churches have been central to the life of our villages for many hundreds of years. The spires and towers of our village churches can be seen for miles around. Many seek out the churches as places of calm and quiet and as a place to draw closer to God in times of thanksgiving and in times of trial. Many in our local community see the village church as their spiritual

home and the venue of choice for the important moments in the lives of their families, whether that be a marriage, the christening of a child, or the funeral of a loved one. Our buildings exert a powerful pull and in they embody in their brick and stone God's unchanging love. This is good news.

For many in the villages the Autumn and Winter services, Harvest, Remembrance and Christmas are celebrated faithfully and the church community are glad to serve the village in this way. Over Christmas in 2023 we welcomed more people to services in church than we have in many a year. This is also good news.

In spite of this it saddens me to let you know that some of our village churches are not flourishing. In fact some are really struggling. We are struggling to have a full compliment of lay officers serving on our Parochial Church Councils. A Parochial Church Council (PCC) is a corporate charitable body, a managing committee of a Church of England Church and


consists of clergy and churchwardens of the parish, together with representatives of the congregation. Legally the PCC is responsible for the financial affairs of the church parish and the maintenance of its assets. It also assists the clergy in the management of church affairs, and promoting the mission of the church. Some of those that are serving in this way are feeling tired and, while still loving the churches and worshipping faithfully, they feel that it is time for them to step down from the positions that they have occupied for many years. This presents a problem, while most of our churches are financially just about getting by, we don't have the people needed to sustain the worshipping communities. Hollowell particularly are struggling, and as a church we have written to every household in that village to explain this, but our other churches also have to look to the future and plan as to what will happen next. At a most simple level, if there is no congregation, eventually there will be no church. I don't want to see that happen and along with the PCCs and the congregations we are doing everything we can to ensure the church survives into the future for as long as it has served in the past.

I was asked, what is needed to keep the church open? The answer – just come, come to church, support us with your presence. You will always be welcome.
